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LEADERSHIP REQUIREMENTS FOR TRIPS AND OUTINGS

FRIENDS OF SCOUTING BRETT GORMAN, COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON

1. **Two-deep Leadership:** Two registered adult leaders, or one registered leader and a parent of a participating Scout or other adult, one of who must be at least 21 years of age or older, are required for all trips or outings. There are a few instances, such as patrol activities, when no adult leadership is required. Co-ed overnight activities, even those including parent and child, require male and female adult leaders, both of whom must be 21 years of age or older, and one of whom must be a registered member of the BSA.
2. During transportation to and from planned Scout outings.
3. Meet for departure at a designated area.
4. Prearrange a schedule for periodic checkpoint stops as a group.
5. **Plan a daily destination point.** A common departure site and a daily destination point are a must. If you cannot provide two adults for each vehicle, the minimum required is one adult and two or more youth members – *never one-on-one*.
6. **Safety rule of four: No fewer than four individuals (always with the minimum of two adults) go on any back-country expedition or campout.** If an accident occurs, one person stays with the injured, and two go for help. Additional adult leadership requirements must reflect an awareness of such factors as size and skill level of the group, anticipated environmental conditions, and overall degree of challenge.
- *7. **Male and female leaders must have separate sleeping facilities. Married couples may share the same quarters if appropriate facilities are available.**
8. **Male and female youth participants will not share the same sleeping facility.**
- *9. **Single-room or dormitory-type accommodations for Scouting units: Adults and youth of the same gender may occupy dormitory or single-room accommodations, provided there is a minimum of two adults and four youth. A minimum of one of the adults is required to be youth-protection trained. Adults must establish separation barriers or privacy zones such as a temporary blanket or sheet walls in order to keep their sleeping area and dressing area separated from the youth area.**
10. **When staying in tents, no youth will stay in the tent of an adult other than his or her parent or guardian.** (See paragraph 1 of this section.)
11. If separate shower and latrine facilities are not available, separate times for male and female use should be scheduled and posted for showers. The buddy system should be used for latrines by having one person wait outside the entrance, or provide *Occupied* and *Unoccupied* signs and/or inside door latches.
Adult leaders need to respect the privacy of youth members in situations where the youth are changing clothes or taking showers, and intrude only to the extent that health & safety require. Adults also need to protect their own privacy in similar situations.

12. **Two-deep adult leadership is required for flying activities. For basic orientation flights, the adult licensed pilot in control of the aircraft is sufficient for the flight, while two-deep leadership is maintained on the ground.**

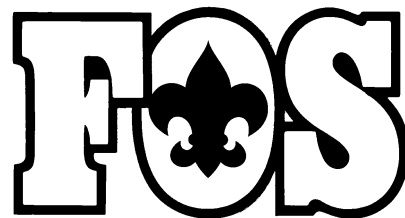

**POLICY ON SCOUT PARTICIPATION
IN POLITICAL EVENTS**

This is a good time to restate the BSA's long-standing policy regarding the participation of Scouts in political rallies and other political events.

Uniformed unit members and leaders may participate in flag ceremonies at political events and may lead the Pledge of Allegiance; however, they should retire after the ceremony and not remain on the speakers' platform or in a conspicuous location where television viewers could construe their presence as an endorsement or symbol of support. In addition, photos of candidates or Scouts in uniform or BSA marks and logos are not allowed in political campaign materials of any kind.

Volunteers and professionals must be alert to situations that would imply that the BSA favors one candidate over another. Strict observance of our long-standing policy against the active participation of uniformed Scouts and leaders in political events is mandatory.

The 22nd World Scout Jamboree will be hosted by Sweden from July 27, 2011 to August 7, 2011. The Jamboree will bring together 40,000 Scouts, Venturers, leaders, and staff for twelve days. They will share adventure, international friendship, personal growth, and development.

The theme for the Jamboree is **"Simply Scouting"**. Scouts from around the world will share what Scouting in their countries is like, and experience Scouting in Sweden where the average temperature is 60 degrees Fahrenheit in August – perfect for full-speed Scout activities at the Jamboree.

The twelve Councils in Area 3 of the Central Region are planning to send one Troop to the Jamboree. These Councils are located in eastern Missouri, western Illinois, eastern Iowa, and southern Wisconsin. There will be seven Troops from the Central Region (about 25% of the USA).

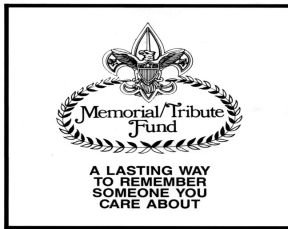
The Scoutmaster for the World Scout Jamboree Troop is Roger Engelbart, a veteran Scouter who attended the 2007 World Scout Jamboree in England as a Troop leader, is responsible for six Troops to the 2010 National Jamboree, was a Scoutmaster at the 2005 National Jamboree, and has served his Council and others in numerous leadership positions. Scouts and Venturers must be between the ages of 14 and 17 on July 27, 2011 (specifically those born between July 25, 1993 and July 27, 1997). Adults who want to serve on the International Service Team (IST) to staff the Jamboree must be 18 at the start of the camp.

The cost of participation in this Jamboree is: \$3525 for Scouts and adult leaders; \$1750 for IST ages 18-25; and, \$1950 for IST ages 26 and up.

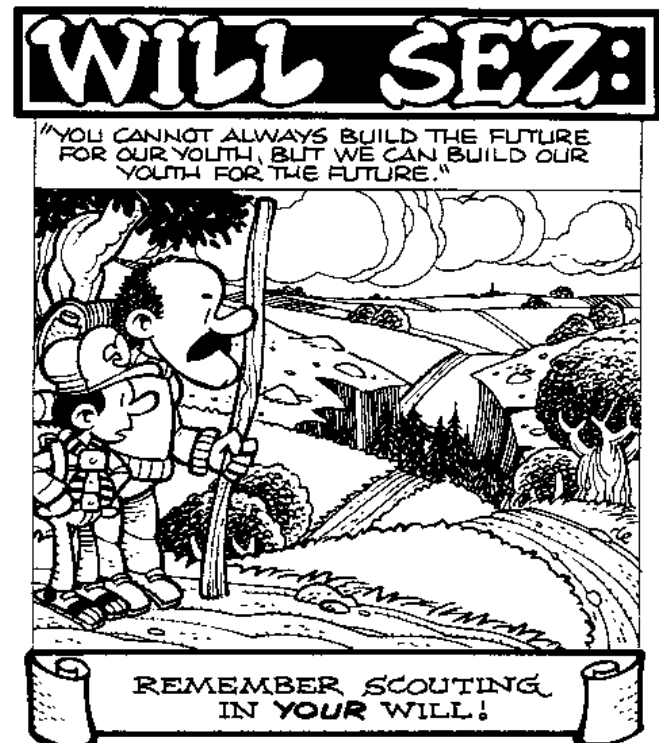

Near Miss Reporting

What is a near-miss event?

A near-miss event is defined as an unintentional unsafe occurrence that could have resulted in an injury, fatality, or property damage. Only a fortunate break in the chain of events prevented an injury, fatality or damage.

Why should I submit a near-miss report?

A near miss experienced by a Scout or Scouter can improve the knowledge, skills and abilities of everyone who is made aware of it. Reporting your near-miss event to www.mississippivalleybsa.org will help prevent an injury or fatality of a member of the Scouting family. Near-miss reporting has worked effectively in other industries, especially aviation, since team members have more knowledge. Industries using near-miss reporting systems have lower injury rates and fewer worker fatalities.

How do I participate?

The Mississippi Valley Council website now has a section entitled, “Near Miss Reporting”. This section is toward the top of the page and is highlighted in red. Simply click on the title and you will be directed to a description of the program. Users should then click on the tab that says, “Click here to report a near miss” and a blank e-mail screen will appear. Describe your scenario and hit send. The e-mail will be sent to the head of the Mississippi Valley’s Risk Management Committee, a volunteer position. This information will be reviewed by the Risk Management Committee and, if appropriate, the incident and safety suggestions will be distributed throughout the Council to ensure that others do not experience a similar situation. Punitive action will not be taken for near misses reported.

Will it make a difference?

The best ways to prevent injury and death by accidental causes is to raise awareness and to educate. By sharing your near miss incident, valuable lessons can be shared with others to ensure our Scouting family can utilize the lessons learned to avoid similar situations in the future.

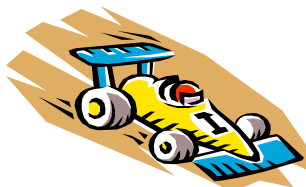

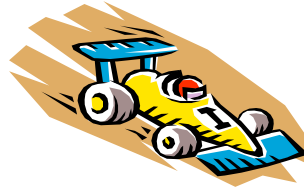
