Kits are still available at the Quincy and Burlington Scout Shops.




Witte Foundation Assists with Burlington Service Center Upgrades

Beginning in 2018 the Mississippi Valley Council applied to the John J. Witte, Jr. Foundation for a grant with the hope of investing in our Burlington Service Center. Three years later and our strong partnership has transformed both the inside and outside of the building. We have a few more small projects that should be wrapped up in the beginning of October, however you can see a list of our completed projects below and a few of our most recent pictures.

- Painting the exterior siding which was last painted in 2002
- Replaced the Scout Shop and office toilets and fixed plumbing issues in all three restrooms
- Purchased and installed four new "Exit" emergency signs
- Installed a new alarm system
- Replaced the sump pump
- Installed new flooring
- Painted the walls and trim



- Installed a TV in the Scout Shop to cycle through upcoming events, adult leader training opportunities, merchandise, etc.
- Replaced old frosted and/or leaky windows which were original to the house – nearly 39 years old
- Replaced the curtains & shades which were worn thin, sun faded, and falling down
- Replaced the blinds in the conference room
- Replaced the aluminum storm door that was blown off during a high-wind storm
- Replaced the entire front door including the frame
- Placed a new awning to properly highlight the correct door for entry
- Repaired tears and peeling wallpaper in the Scout Shop
- Upgraded the fixtures and furniture in the Scout Shop
- Upgraded the fixtures in the backstock room to allow for us to consolidate from 3 storage areas to 1
- Replaced the vanity and faucet in two bathrooms and replaced the broken sink and countertop in the kitchenette



Small-Group Program Days



With the success of our small-group in-person Program Days over the summer, the Mississippi Valley Council has continued to create safe in-person programs for all Scouts. Eleven ATV Days for youth 16+ at Saukenauk Scout Reservation. Fresh off the heels of switching from phase 3 to 4 of the Restore Illinois plan, we immediately began planning program days at Saukenauk Scout Reservation.

Our aim was and is simple: provide program for youth in the safest way possible. There is risk with any activity however we worked with the Health Department, Local Governments, and Medical Experts to create a mitigation plan that included a pre-attendance medical screening one week prior to the events and at arrival and frequent sanitation of both the equipment and the kids.

Fourteen Program Days have already occurred with many more on the schedule. Themes include:

- ATV Outdoor Course
- Climbing
- Archery
- Cub Scout Adventure Day Camps
- Zip Lining
- Rifle Shooting
- Shotgun Shooting
