- Your Site Guide will bring the Campsite Check Out Form which will need to be completed before you leave your campsite.
- Submit your Evaluation Forms you'll receive on Friday.
- Your departure packet will include troop advancement sheet, summer camp patches, medical forms, and medicines. We strongly suggest that you <u>review the contents</u> **before** you leave camp. It is very difficult to clear up discrepancies after you leave.

Sunday Check-in Schedule & Procedures:

You're finally here! Plan on arriving at camp as a Unit, and park in the parking lot any time after 11:00am. Please proceed directly to your Campsite and begin setting up. Your *Site Guide* will arrive to welcome you to camp and take you through the camp orientation. **Check-in will take place at the Trading Post.** One Troop Leader will need to bring all health forms to the trading post. We will hand out copies of the Scouts' merit badge schedules and the daily schedule at this time.

*Units are not allowed to camp the night before their week of camp starts! We don't not have a health officer on site until Sunday morning. Any exceptions but be approved by the Camp Director with enough notice to find a Health Officer.

Orientation

Meet Your Unit's Site Guide – Site Guide will meet you at your campsite at 12:30pm. Your Site Guide will stay with you through most of Sunday to assist in setting up your campsite and to walk you through the orientation.



Unload gear and set-up camp — Units that bring trailers will be allowed to drive one vehicle back to their campsite to drop the trailer for the week. Additional vehicles will not be allowed to drive into camp. Please plan accordingly. No vehicles will be allowed in the campsite after dinner on Sunday.

If you have worked everything out in advance, your registration should go smoothly. Please don't wait until camp to pay fees or ask unanswered questions as this slows down check-in.

Medical Check – Please bring all official complete BSA medical forms and medications with you to check-in. You will be required to have parts A, B and C. We can only accept fully completed official BSA Health and Medical Records, signed by an MD, DO, PA or NP. Chiropractor signatures are not acceptable. A school, sports, or work physical exam is NOT acceptable. If you have a Unit Lock Box for medications, you may keep prescriptions in your campsite. Please note the vaccination policy in our Health and Safety chapter at the end of this guide. If a member of your unit does not have a medical form, they may not stay the night on Sunday and may not return to camp until a completed form is submitted. We have until Campfire on the first day of camp to get any deficiencies fixed.

Swim Checks – All Unit members (youth and adults) will participate in swim checks. You may do swim checks prior to arriving at camp (form on website). You will still need to visit the swimming area for an orientation. THE AQUATICS DIRECTOR MAY RETEST ANY SCOUT OR SCOUTER AT THEIR DISCRETION.

Patrol Method Orientation – Both our stellar camps follow the *Patrol Method* which is, as our founder stated, not simply *a way* to run the Scouting program but the *only way* to run the program.

Dining Hall Orientation – Learn the dos and don'ts for our Dining operations as well as dining hall etiquette.

Camp Tour – Yes, we know that many of you have been to camp before. That being said, many of our merit Badge locations change from year to year depending on the facilities/equipment needed, timing of the merit badges, and other factors. Please attend the camp tour so you know where ALL activities and merit badges are.

Utilizing only what you bring with you, pack into the back reaches of camp and set up shelter for the evening. Scouts will depart after dinner and return the next morning in time for breakfast. Adults may attend as well. Shelters will be built throughout the day on Friday.

Scouts will NOT complete all the requirements for 2^{nd} and 1^{st} Class ranks, which take roughly 3-4 months to finish when done properly. This will help put a dent in those ranks as we focus on the ones that lend themselves to the outdoors.

One leader should sign up Scouts for Merit Badges beginning April 15. Print off your Merit Badge schedule and confirm with each Scout. Encourage them to begin working on the prerequisites.

Prerequisites

Please note that we do not give away merit badges freely. They must be earned. There are very few merit badges that can be completed 100% at camp without doing some prep work.

Please review the full spreadsheet on our website at www.mississippivalleybsa.org/camps/camp-resources-3/ in order to know what requirements, purchases, or fees are involved with the merit badges.

Verification involves bringing a Scoutmaster written & signed letter, bringing pictures of the completed items, or bring the project/report itself.

Organizing Your Unit

Unit Leaders

Make sure you are familiar with this guide, check the website often, and attend Roundtable for up-to-date information. https://www.mississippivalleybsa.org/camps/

All adults that are staying overnight must be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America, with Youth Protection and submitted Background Check.

Start by prepping your Unit early and promote camp year-round to help keep Scouts excited about summer camp.

- Attend a Pre-Camp Leaders meeting.
- Mark all deadline dates (deposits, camperships, final payment, meetings, etc.) on the Unit's calendar.
- Sell Camp Cards as a unit to help Scouts pay their way to camp and emphasize being thrifty.
- Schedule time with each Scout to go over possible Merit Badges and special programs.
- Schedule time with the Order of the Arrow to conduct unit elections.
- Conduct a "Troop Camp Kick-Off" to inform families of plans and answer questions.
- Finalize rosters and submit merit badge preferences online via the camp registration system.
- Make a list of any special allergies or special food requirements to share with the council prior to check-in.
- Make and share plans for Visitor's Night for maximum parent participation.
- Organize all medical forms, payments, and travel for camp.

We encourage you to take the following steps:

- Schedule a time during your Troop Meeting for Patrols & Scouts to review the merit badge schedule.
- Have them write out which merit badges they desire to take and an alternate in case the class is full.
- Make sure to talk with the Scout about prerequisites, things they must do before camp, or they will not complete the badge and will receive a 'partial' to which they will need to find a counselor to complete.

Tents & Cots

Tents and Cots are available for use free of charge at Saukenauk Scout Reservation. Please e-mail us with the quantity of tents & cots by May 15th to Cordaro.boughton@scouting.org to reserve your tents and cots.

Dining Hall

We aim to maximize the amount of time your Scouts get to spend working on merit badges, exploring, adventuring, and making memories.

Breakfast

Breakfast will be served from 7:15 AM to 8:30 AM. We are fine if Scouts want to sleep in or skip breakfast entirely, that is a Troop decision.

Lunch

Lunch will be served at 12:15 PM. Lunches will be served in the Dining Hall. Please clean up after yourselves. A peanut butter and jelly sandwich will be available upon request.

Dinner

Dinner will be served per tradition with a buffet line and salad bar.

Parent Information

Informed families can greatly enhance your Scout's summer camp experience and ease anxieties for first time campers. Be familiar with this guide and work closely with your Unit leadership to stay informed.

- Mark all deadlines on your calendar ask your Unit leader as they may require earlier deadlines to process all Unit members' money and paperwork before they turn it in as a troop. Make sure you take advantage of the Early Bird camp fees.
- Schedule time to get your Scout's physical done. Use the official BSA Health and Medical Form and turn it into your Unit. We suggest you keep a copy for your records.



- Work with Unit Leadership to find out which Merit Badges and programs are good for your Scout.
- Look through suggested items to bring to camp and work with Unit leadership to determine all gear to be taken to camp.
- Attend your "Troop Camp Kick-off" to get the latest information and ask questions.
- Mark Family Night Dates for camp and plan on attending and supporting your Scout!

Coming and Going Safety

The safety and security of every Scout is of paramount concern to all leaders and Staff. To enhance our security efforts we require parents, leaders, and Scouts to sign in and sign out at the Trading Post when entering or leaving camp during the week. Scouts who are leaving camp early will need to check out at the Trading Post with our staff while being accompanied by an adult from the unit to authorize the departure. The adult checking out the scout must fill out the release form and present photo ID. If there are concerns about an individual Scout's well-being and protection, the unit leader should contact the Camp Director.



Visitor Policy

Visitors are always welcome in camp. Overnight accommodation for parents and visitors are not available during summer camp unless they are a registered camper and are registered members of the Boy Scouts of America. Having completed Youth Protection Training. Upon arrival, all visitors must check in and check out at the Trading post (includes family night).

All visitors will be expected to follow all camp rules, please inform families before their arrival. Meals for

visitors at camp are \$10.00 per meal and can be purchased in the Trading Post.



What to Bring to Camp

You'll want to be prepared for your week at camp. The following lists should be a good beginning. Feel free to add to the list and check with your unit as to what equipment may be provided.

- o Medications labeled with easy-to-read directions for the Medical Officer
- Prerequisite Merit Badge proof/documentation
- o Scouts BSA uniform: shorts, shirt, socks.
- Scouts BSA Handbook
- o Flashlight
- Appropriate hat (Scouts BSA or troop hat preferred)
- Appropriate summer clothing: i.e. t-shirt & shorts (Scouts BSA or Troop shirts preferred)
- Notebook and pencils
- Personal gear (towel, soap, toothbrush/paste, comb)
- Raincoat or poncho
- Sleeping bag or blankets
- Sneakers and/or hiking shoes
- Shower shoes or agua-socks
- Spending money for the Trading Post OR a refillable Pre-Paid Card!
- Sweatshirt or light jacket
- Swimsuit
 - o Boys No brief style speedo's allowed
 - Girls One-piece or two-piece that is high neck crop bikini top no ties allowed for tops or bottoms
- Underwear and socks
- Bug spray (non-aerosol)
- Sunscreen (non-aerosol)
- Merit Badge Books for merit badges for which you are registered.
- Troop and patrol flags

Optional

- Cell Phone & Charger some merit badges may have optional activities that are enhanced with cell phones
- o Compass
- Individual first aid kit
- Pocketknife

Order of the Arrow

The Order of the Arrow (OA) is Scouting National Honor Society. The OA recognizes those Scouts and Scouters who go above and beyond in their unit and live by the Scout Oath and Scout Law. The Order of the Arrow takes the virtues that make the Scouts great and expands them through various programs, training, leadership opportunities, and more.



Black Hawk Lodge is the local Order of the Arrow Lodge for Mississippi Valley Council. The Lodge holds four main events each year. These consist of Lodge Leadership Development, Spring Conclave, Fall Reunion, and Winter Banquet. These are only a few of the events held by the Lodge each year.

A large part of the Order of the Arrow is Cheerful Service. The Lodge provides service year-round to the Council, Camps, and Community year-round. The service ranges from serving staff during events, clearing trails, painting buildings, adding improvements to camp, promoting the council at expositions, sand bagging during a flood, and many more.



Every year Lodges from multiple Councils get together for a Section Conclave. During this get-together, there are various unique activities, competitions, and shows. On a larger scale, every two years, Lodges from across the Nation (and further) get together at a college campus for the National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC). NOAC is a once in a lifetime experience for every Arrowmen who attends.

In Order to be eligible for election in the Order of the Arrow, a Scout must obtain the rank of First Class, and have completed 15 days and nights of

overnight scout camping. Once the requirements are met, a unit election must be completed. Scouters (18+) are required to achieve the same camping requirements as well as a nomination must be submitted to the Lodge. Those who are elected will be announced during the Call-out Ceremony during Summer Camp. For more information about membership requirements see https://oa-bsa.org/about/membership. It is each unit's responsibility to schedule a Unit Election prior to Summer Camp. To schedule an election visit blackhawklodge.org.

Out of Council units are still able to recognize those who have been selected as candidates. To do so, a letter from the home Lodge must be given to the Order of the Arrow Coordinator for that week of Camp. Unit elections are not allowed to be performed for an out of Council unit due to National Policy.

National Youth Leadership Training

at Camp Illinek, 6610 Iron Bridge Rd, Chatham, IL

The NYLT course centers around the concepts of what a leader must BE, what they must KNOW, and what they must DO. The key elements are then taught with a clear focus on HOW TO. The skills come alive during the week as the patrol goes on a Quest for the Meaning of Leadership. Participants camp, work, play and learn, living a month in the life of a model troop/ team/crew condensed into an intense week long conference. They experience the stages of team development, practice from a "toolbox" of leadership skills and learn that leadership requires vision, goals, and planning. Participants learn how to be a leading influence in their own unit; discovering resources, methods, games and new skills to make unit meetings, treks and other activities more exciting and worthwhile. 
SSR Back Country Experience

General Camp Rules

All units in camp must have at least two (2) leaders with the troop 24 hours a day. Both leaders must be at least 21 years of age, registered in Scouting, and current on their Youth Protection Training. Leaders may rotate if necessary.

The consumption, possession, or use of alcohol in any form, and all controlled or illegal substances while on or near the premises of camp property is not permitted. Being under the influence or even having alcohol on the breath is a negative influence on our youth. Those individuals will be asked to leave, whether they are campers, leaders, staff, or visitors.

No firearms, bows, or arrows of any kind may be brought to camp. Absolutely no fireworks or personal ammunition of any kind are permitted at camp.

Liquid fuels are not permitted at camp. Propane may be used, but only under the supervision of an adult.

No fires or open flames are allowed in or near tents. This includes self-contained stoves and lanterns, mosquito coils, citronella candles and other such items. All tents must be clearly marked, "NO FLAMES IN TENTS."

Sheath knives are not practical for the type of camping done at summer camp. Do not allow your Scouts to bring them to camp.

Avoid using aerosol spray cans while at camp wherever possible.

Leaders are not allowed to smoke in program areas, campsites or anywhere in the presence of youth. Smoking is not permitted inside any camp structures. This includes the use of electronic cigarettes, personal vaporizers, or electronic nicotine delivery systems that simulate tobacco smoking. A designated area will be available for those adults wishing to do so.

Campers and RV's are not permitted in camp without prior approval of the Scout Office.

No electricity, except solar, is to be generated in campsites which includes running of extension cords from power sources.

Troops that have disability needs will work with the Camp Director prior to camp to accommodate where possible.

Batteries (inverter and/or rechargeable marine batteries) used for medical needs are allowed to be recharged at a location

specified by the Camp Ranger. Vehicles will not be allowed to be used as sources of power in campsites.

All private vehicles are to be parked in the camp parking lot. Troop trailers can remain in the campsite, but vehicles cannot.

Personal bicycles are not permitted on camp property during summer camp.

No pets are to be brought to camp.

No additional family members or additional guests will be allowed to stay at camp unless they are registered campers.

Identification Bracelet - Each Scout and adult leader will be issued a color-coded bracelet for identification purposes. These bracelets must be worn at all times.

Closed toed shoes/sandals must be worn-please no flip-flops or open-toed sandals. This is being done for safety reasons. Flip flops/open-toed sandals are allowed in the shower house, pool, and beach area.

Youth Protection policies & adequate adult leadership are always required.





Health and Safety

Health Lodge and Emergency Care

24-hour emergency medical care will be available by a Health Officer. A

Scout or leader that has a medical problem should report to the Health Lodge as soon as possible. A medical doctor is on call for medical advice and emergencies and an AED is located in the Health Lodge.



Insurance

The Mississippi Valley Council provides accident and liability insurance for those persons registered in the Boy

Scouts of America and are registered campers. No other youth are permitted to camp nor participate in the program of the camp for insurance reasons. Out of Council units must present proof of insurance from their council upon check-in on Sunday or mail to the Scout Service Center prior to the camp session. Any accident that occurs while they are at camp is covered first by your insurance and then our insurance kicks in second. Claim forms must be filled out by the parents and physician and submitted to the Scout Service Center. Additional information about filing claims can be obtained from the Council Service Center (217) 224-0204.

BSA Health and Medical Records

The BSA's Health and Medical form can be downloaded at the Council website at www.mississippivalleybsa.org. (Parts A, B & C are required). The medical exam must be performed, signed and dated by an MD, DO, PA or NP. Chiropractor signatures are not acceptable. A school, sports, or work physical exam is NOT acceptable. Any camper that does not have the appropriate signature on the BSA Health and Medical Record will not be permitted to stay on site for more than 72 hours. We suggest the family keep a copy for their records.

Vaccinations

A tetanus immunization is required to participate. Other immunizations that are recommended can be found in the Guide to Safe Scouting and the Annual Health & Medical Record form published in January of 2022.

Medication

While in camp, medications may be held by either the Health Officer or a Unit Leader. A Unit Leader may only keep medication if they can provide lockable storage at all times. All other medications will be checked in with the Health Officer.

Tenting Policy

- Separate tenting arrangements must be provided for male and female adults as well as for male and female youth.
- Youth sharing tents must be no more than two years apart in age.
- In all other programs, youth and adults tent separately.
- Spouses may share tents.
